Continuing the Conversation...

"The LORD rules! Let the earth rejoice!... Light is planted like seed for the righteous person; joy too for those whose heart is right. Rejoice in the LORD, righteous ones! Give thanks to his holy name!" (Psalm 97:1a, 11-12)

In spite of everything that 2020 threw at us, we ended the year in a pretty good place. Although worship looks and feels very different right now we are still worshiping and we have continued doing important ministries. Studies have been put on hold, but I tried a new thing with a livestreamed daily devotion

for Advent. We are financially in a decent place as we go into the new year and I look forward to the possibilities of trying more new things by building on what I have learned in the past year, even as we slowly move toward getting back to normal life.

You can also look on page 5 for a celebration story that helped finish our year out strong. I know sometimes when the challenges of certain days starts to wear on me it helps me to look back at what we have accomplished for the Kingdom of God and then to look up in praise and thanksgiving to the One who holds us in the palm of his hand and loves us with a never-ending love. Knowing I am a beloved child of God gives me the courage and fortitude to keep moving forward.

Looking forward, in the near future, I see us taking baby steps back to worshiping fully in church, livestreaming our services to an online mission field. We will get there, please bear with me. As the Psalmist notes above, "light is planted like a seed..." and seeds don't sprout and immediately produce fruit.

I know some get frustrated with the slow movement forward and even what feels like a backward step, please know I hear you and appreciate your feelings but I have to consider the bigger picture and do my prayerful best to care for all in our congregation while still working to be a vital and fruitful church.

This is uncharted territory and throughout Advent and Christmas I kept coming back to Mary's story in Scripture. Mary was on the ultimate journey of uncharted territory as she said "Yes," to bringing God's Son to birth, to live among us, to feel what we feel, to experience life as we experience it. As I consider Mary, and how she rejoiced even with all of the unknowns facing her, what we are facing now seems small in comparison. Yes, I know it's a pandemic and that is big—but birthing God as an unwed mother, in a paternalistic culture? That's huge, and still Mary rejoices.

It reminds me that we are all here for a bigger purpose (God's purpose) not just to fulfill our wants, to sing some songs, say some prayers, and get a few warm fuzzies in.

So, what is our purpose? Jesus left a mission for us to complete, to be his hands and feet and heart in the world, carrying his message of reconciling and redeeming love to those who need to hear it. Of course we care for each other too. That is all part of being Christ's church, Christ's body in the world.

The looking back I mentioned is helpful because it reminds us we are still faithfully "being" the church. The looking forward is done with a lot of prayer because it requires faithfully and joyfully following where God is leading, even when the circumstances don't look favorable. The looking forward part also requires joint effort; I need you praying with me and discerning God's call and direction. That means I need to hear from you also, to hear what you are discerning God calling us to do.

2021 will still have it's challenges (every year does). But I ask you, who do we trust in? Can we say with Jeremiah: "I know the plans I have in mind for you, declares the LORD; they are plans for peace, not disaster, to give you a future filled with hope. When you call me and come and pray to me, I will listen to you. When you search for me, yes, search for me with all your heart, you will find me. I will be present for you, declares the LORD, and I will end your captivity." (Jeremiah 29:11-14a)

Join me in daily prayer, asking God to break through in our lives and hearts and direct and equip our journey into 2021 for God's glory and our benefit as Christ's Body here as the Sparta United Methodist Church and beyond.

Because our Giving Is Worship

"You will be enriched in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God. This service that you perform is not only supplying the needs of the Lord's people but is also overflowing in many expressions of thanks to God." (2 Corinthians 9:10-12)

God established a design for worshipping when God revealed to Moses the plan for the Tent of Meeting (aka Tabernacle). Central to that worship was sacrificial giving. God required gifts of animals and grain be brought to the Tabernacle to be sacrificed and offered to God because it was pleasing to God. These gifts were the first fruits of the agricultural work of the people representing a tithe (10%) of their production.

God knew that an institution like Temple worship would require resources to be sustained. We read in the Old Testament that the people's gifts of meat and bread, cooked in a way pleasing to God, directly provided food for the priests, guards, and caretakers of the temple and the spiritual leaders of the tribes. Sharing the fruits of the harvest became the large feasts we read about in Jesus' time.

In the modern Christian church, we maintain this pattern of giving designed by God. Now, people are called to give in a way pleasing to God: first fruits representing 10% of each family's productivity. Though, in modern times, it is money rather than agricultural produce.

These gifts to God, offered and dedicated in our worship services, are used to maintain the institution of the church by supporting its ministry and mission. This includes worship, congregational care, spiritual development, hospitality and outreach, and missions by way of support for clergy and staff, building maintenance and other budgetary items.

What we can conclude from this is that we give first because it is a gift pleasing to God. As a result of our giving to God in worship, we also support all aspects of the important work of the church.


