Continuing the Conversation...

"Let us hold fast to the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who has promised is faithful. And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds..." (Hebrews 10:23-24)



What a year 2020 has been so far! But, I don't have to tell any of you that, this has been a highly unusual and challenging year for everybody. January started out fairly normal but by March our collective worlds were turned upside down because of COVID 19. It put a real cramp in our style and our

plans. After the initial shock of closing our doors began to wear off, I was reminded of a plaque I was given years ago that has a prominent place in my home office. It reads: We plan, God laughs.

Not that I think God is laughing about our current world situation, but all of my best laid plans for Lent and many other things were brought to a sudden halt in March; and yet here I am in November still worshiping God, still moving forward, still doing my best to lead Christ's church. I have been reminded daily throughout this time that no matter what any given day brings, God is still in control, still loves me (and you), still holds me (and you) in the palm of his hand. I have witnessed God working throughout this time for us and through us as we keep our trust in him.

As I prepared to look back on what I set for goals in 2020 I was happy to see that even though my initial best laid plans did not come to fruition, I can say that I still made some progress on my goals.

The first goal was to "work diligently with the church leadership in setting up an Accountable Leadership structure that works for this congregation and continues to improve communication as we continually update and live into a ministry plan that guides us to be a vital and growing church that loves God and our neighbors." Although we had to be more

creative in our methods of communication, thanks to the help of Ad Council chair, Toni Burrows, we were able to continue the conversation around Accountable Leadership through Ad Council meetings, newsletter articles, and a Town Hall video created by Toni and emailed to all we have email addresses for.

My second goal was to "continue working with a Stewardship Task Force to educate the congregation and brainstorm new fund raising initiatives to strengthen our financial future so we will be a positive force for continued ministry into the future." Again, this didn't pan out quite as I had imagined, but the lines of communication around finances and stewardship were kept open through letters, worship announcements, and The Chimes. I also have joined the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation Board serving on the Education and Development Committee. Part of my work with the committee was to participate in the online stewardship retreat—speaking on the stewardship challenge grant. Our stewardship task force was invited to take part in the online retreat and then gather to plan for the future.

My final goal was to "make honoring my Sabbath and vacation/family time a priority in the coming year in order to take better care of myself and to model good self-care to those I lead. I will also continue in a healthier lifestyle for the same reason." I have maintained some healthier habits when it comes to diet and exercise and found the proof of success in my latest annual wellness check up. All of the numbers I have been working to change (weight, blood sugar, cholesterol) have gone down to healthier levels. Hurray!

Where I failed miserably with this goal was honoring my Sabbath; the unusual circumstances of this year found me learning new ways to offer worship (so thankful for those who walk alongside me in this continuing "adventure"). I also took on more work with the everyday running of the church office as the sole employee working in the office and sometimes cleaning and disinfecting in the church when custodial help wasn't available; it is amazing what it takes to keep a church this size running smoothly. Long story short, one day seemed to blend into the next so that the last few months became a blur of activity. I feel the need to apologize to you all for not being a good role model and not practicing what I preach about making intentional

time to spend with God. I felt the pain of not heeding my own words as I believe I came close to burning out by the end of summer. I have since repented and have begun once again making that intentional, prayerful time with God. Hiring Michele as our administrative assistant has made a huge difference in keeping me on track there. She has taken a huge weight off my shoulders even as she continues to learn the ins and outs of church office work.

None of us knows what the next year will hold for us, but I do want to set some goals (having learned beyond a shadow of a doubt this year the importance of flexibility). My goals are:

- 1) Leadership: As I anticipate the church moving to the Accountable Leadership model, or what we will call a Servant Leadership Board, I will continue to work diligently with the church leaders to form a creative, God-centered team to love and lead this congregation in doing the ministry Jesus Christ calls us to within our community and world.
- 2) Communication: With the new Servant Leadership structure in place communication will become more important than ever. I will strive to keep the lines of communication open and transparent, using every means possible to share information and receive input and feedback without being needlessly redundant. I will also use the means we have at hand to tell "our story" and "our vision for ministry" to the community, hoping to make fruitful connections with like-minded individuals and institutions.
- 3) Sabbath: I will continue, with the help of my family and others around me, to make honoring my Sabbath and vacation/family time a priority in the coming year in order to take better care of myself and to model good self-care to those I lead. I will also continue in a healthier lifestyle for the same reason. Hold me to this folks!

Through all of this I challenge the congregation to struggle with me in answering the following three questions as we minister together: 1) Does our congregational life keep God as the center, the focus, our source for truth and life? 2) Do our church activities and services form members with the character of God's people? 3) Do our church events and worship services create us to be a community of faith according to the biblical descriptions?

During the unusual times, it is important to remember:


"Never a Christmas morning, Never the old year ends. But someone thinks of someone, Old days, old times, old friends."

May we all recall the memories of past celebrations, traditions and gatherings of thank God for those – and then, with hope in our hearts, look forward to those times again!



Food Pantry Update

At the start of the Covid-19 outbreak in late March, the Ecumenical Food Pantry began serving guests by pre-packing non-perishable foods and having a daily form indicating choices for fresh produce, dairy, and meat. Only volunteers were allowed to enter the pantry. Although not ideal, this worked well throughout the summer months and early fall.

With the cold weather approaching, the pantry board decided to once again allow guests to enter the pantry and select their items. Safety precautions include a maximum of 2 shoppers at a time and 2 waiting. Hand sanitizer must be used when entering the pantry. Masks must be worn and will be provided if needed. Social distancing will be possible due to the restricted numbers. Carts will be wiped down after each use.

With the reopening and needing to limit numbers inside the pantry, the board also made the decision to change the days of the week the pantry serves guests. Monday mornings are delivery days for the Hunger Task Force truck and the larger number of volunteers working would make social distancing and serving guests impossible.

Therefore, the pantry is now closed on Mondays and instead open on Fridays. The other days remain the same. Hours currently are Tuesday thru Friday 10 a.m. until noon and Tuesday evening 5 p.m. until 7 p.m.

With senior citizens making up the majority of our volunteers and concerns about how the virus affects that age group, it has been a struggle to find volunteers for the open hours. The Methodist Church is in charge of staffing on Tuesdays. If anyone would like to volunteer or would like more information concerning the pantry call Lori Ascher at 343-4068. The pantry thanks the Methodist congregation for everything they do to support our efforts.

As a side note: The Holiday Train will be a virtual event on Saturday, December 12 starting at 7 p.m. and lasting an hour and 15 minutes. It will be live streamed via Facebook at *facebook.com/canadian.pacific* The event will remain on the site until the end of the year.

I was honored to be the laity delegate for a second year at Wisconsin UMC Annual Conference, October 24. Pastor and I did not physically attend; however, it was conducted only one day through Zoom and voting online.

Bishop Hee-Soo Jung's greeting to laity session 2020 is the event I enjoyed the most during annual conference. Bishop states that 2020 has been a challenging year for all of us and what does our future hold. The Wisconsin Conference's pursuit of advancing radical inclusion and racial justice for our world, requires us to learn the systems and processes that dismantles what excludes us from being one body and one spirit in God. The Service of Licensing, Commissioning and Ordination was Saturday evening for three clergy licensed as local pastors, four commissioned for the work of elder and one commissioned for the work of deacon.

Numerous action items were voted on and passed, some topics included: conference treasurer and secretary, clergy rental/housing allowance, past service annuity rates, clergy compensation, 2021 budget, covenants of affiliation with Christian Community Homes, Sheboygan Senior, UMC Children's Services and Evergreen Retirement, disaffiliation agreement pursuant to para 2553. From the Parish Nurse...

In recent days, as COVID-19 has been declared a global pandemic and countries have taken urgent measures to stem the spread of infection, I ask God to use me and help me to pray.

This crisis is urgent, and at times I feel, as I am sure some of you feel, powerless. But perhaps feeling small is the best reminder to pray. Prayer is how we actively practice believing, so simply, so



confidently, that God has the whole world in his hands. It's where we "let petitions and praises shape our worries into prayers, letting God know our concerns" (Phil. 4:6–7, The Message). Prayer is never the last resort of God's people. It is our first point of action.

With that in mind, here is a list of 20 prayers to pray during this pandemic. Each one addresses the specific needs of a specific community. I'm fortunate to be a part of medical professionals, some of whom gave me advice on how best to pray for them at this time. I've included their responses here. I've also tried to think broadly about how the rest of us are impacted by the current crisis.

This list isn't comprehensive, of course, but it's a good place to start. My hope is that it can provide words for us as we pray individually or (if also virtually!) as a church body. so As COVID-19 sends the globe into crisis, hopefully it also sends us to our knees. For our prayer...

- 1. For the sick and infected: God, heal and help sustain bodies and spirits. Contain the spread of infection.
- 2. For our vulnerable populations: God, protect our elderly and those suffering from chronic disease. Provide for the poor, alleviate added stress for the uninsured.
- 3. For the young and the strong: God, give them the necessary caution to keep them from unwittingly spreading this disease. Inspire them to help.
- 4. For our local, state, and federal governments: God, help our elected officials as they allocate the necessary resources and restrictions for combating this pandemic. Help them to provide more tests and equipment needed.
- 5. For our scientific community, leading the charge to understand the disease and communicate its gravity: God, give them knowledge, wisdom, and a persuasive voice.
- 6. For the media, committed to providing up-to-date information: God, help them to communicate with appropriate seriousness without causing panic.

- 7. For consumers of media, looking to be well-informed: God, help us find the most helpful local information to equip us to be good neighbors. Keep us from anxiety and panic, and enable us to implement the recommended strategies, even at a cost to ourselves.
- 8. For those with mental health challenges who feel isolated, anxious, and helpless: God, provide them every necessary support.
- 9. For the homeless, unable to practice the protocols of social distancing in the shelter system: Protect them from disease, and provide isolation shelters in every city.
- 10. For international travelers stuck in foreign countries: God, help them return home safely and quickly.
- 11. For Christian missionaries throughout the world, especially in areas with high rates of infection: God, provide them with words of hope, and equip them to love and serve those around them.
- 12. For workers in a variety of industries facing layoffs and financial hardship: God, keep them from panic, and inspire your church to generously support them.
- 13. For families with young children at home for the foreseeable future: God, help mothers and fathers to partner together creatively for the care and flourishing of their children. For single mothers and fathers, grow their networks of support.
- 14. For parents who cannot stay home from work but must find care for their children: God, present them with creative solutions.
- 15. For those in need of regular therapies and treatments that must now be postponed: God, help them to stay patient and positive.
- 16. For business leaders making difficult decisions that affect the lives of their employees: God, give these women and men wisdom, and help them to lead self-sacrificially.
- 17. For pastors and church leaders faced with the challenges of how to pastor their congregants.
- 18. For college and university students, whose courses of study are changing, whose placements are canceled, whose graduation is uncertain: God, show them that while life is uncertain, their trust is in you.
- 19. For Christians in every neighborhood, community, and city: May your Holy Spirit inspire us to pray, to give, to love, to serve, and to proclaim the gospel, that the name of Jesus Christ might be glorified around the world.
- 20. For frontline health care workers, we thank you for their vocational call to serve us. We also pray:
- God, keep them safe and healthy. Keep their families safe and healthy.

God, help them to be knowledgeable about the diagnosis and treatment of this disease, as well as the changing protocols.

God, help them to stay clear-minded in the midst of the surrounding panic.

God, deliver them from anxiety for their own loved ones (aging parents, children, spouses, roommates).

God, give them compassion for every patient in their care.

God, provide for them financially, especially if they fall ill and are unable to work.

God, help Christians in health care to exhibit extraordinary peace, so that many would ask about the reason for their hope. Give them opportunities to proclaim the gospel.

God, we know and trust that you are good and do good. Teach us to be your faithful people in this time of global crisis. Help us to follow in the footsteps of our faithful shepherd, Jesus, who laid down his life for the sake of love. Glorify his name as you equip us with everything needed for doing your will. Amen.

The holidays often mean special events and gatherings with friends and family. But because of the COVID-19 pandemic, those traditions will look and feel different this year.

Each November, as the air turns from crisp to chill and pumpkins on front porches are replaced with evergreen wreaths, the excitement of the season starts to settle in. Just before the hustle and bustle takes over, there is a small window where we can simply soak in the anticipation of all that is to come and relish in the nostalgia of holidays past. Administrative Council 2020 in Review

The Administrative Council has been looking at a new direction in how to serve the church. Last October 2019, we invited Dick Jones to speak to us about Accountable Leadership and give us insights on what it is. In November, the Ad Council voted to move forward with the Accountable Leadership model and an article appeared in *The Chimes* newsletter to recap the highlights of the October training.



In January 2020, Pastor Loretta and I came up with a draft of Guiding Principles for the Accountable Leadership board. We used models from several other churches who have already adopted the Accountable Leadership model to develop our own draft version. We presented our draft at the training event held in January for the current leaders. Suggestions and corrections were made to the draft. At the January Administrative Council meeting, the final draft was presented and a motion carried to accept the Sparta UMC Guiding Principles for the Servant Leadership board. Note that we replaced the word Accountable with Servant because we felt it better captures the spirit of what this board will be about – Servant Leadership.

In March, Pastor talked about moving forward with authenticity and intentionality at Ad Council. She presented a book she had read entitled "How to Lead When You Don't Know Where You are Going: Leading in a Liminal Season." In other words, we need to know who we are as a congregation so that we can move forward intentionally in everything that we do. Also in March, as you are painfully aware, COVID-19 changed our way of life. With the church shut down, Pastor Loretta learned how to function as a pastor would under the accountable leadership model. Even though she was operating that way, she did not make decisions outside her jurisdiction. She worked closely with the Staff Pastor Parish Relations Committee when staffing changes occurred and Trustees when building issues needed to be addressed. Pastor also was in communication with Dick Jones whenever she had any questions around the Accountable Leadership model. In August, myself and Pastor Loretta uploaded "Sparta UMC Town Hall Communication" video on Youtube and sent out the link to the congregation so they could keep abreast of what we had been doing so far. In November, at the Church Conference, we will vote to officially adopt the Servant Leadership board.

In April, since we had no in-person worship due to COVID-19, Pastor Loretta, Cyndi Wise, and Lynn and Larry Humphrey began recording the worship service and sending out the link for Youtube so we could all stay connected. That was truly a blessing and has become a weekly occurrence. The Administrative Council began meeting via Zoom, which was new for many, but we were up to the challenge. In May, we arranged for those who might not be able to connect with technology to meet in the Chapel (socially distanced with masks) while Pastor displayed the Zoom Ad Council meeting on the big screen. Even though there wasn't much church business to discuss at our Ad Council meeting, it was very apparent that our servant hearts were alive and beating because we organized a Food Pantry Drive to help those in need especially with the Governor's stay-at-home orders. We invited Lori Ascher to join us and we were able to execute a successful drive in the AMKM Gymnastics parking lot (formerly Colonial Bowling Center). The Sparta Police even joined us and brought in folks curious as to why a Police Car was parked there with its lights on!

In June, Pastor was very careful to follow WI Conference and CDC (Center for Disease Control) Guidelines on re-opening the church for worship. Every other pew was sectioned off. Masks and hand sanitizer were available at all entrances. Offering plates were not passed but placed strategically by the exits. Online giving increased and even during the pandemic, the congregation was faithful in its giving. Hallelujah! As a bonus, we were able to get the big screen televisions (part of the anonymous donation for audio visual upgrade received at the end of 2019) installed in the sanctuary by the first in-person worship service. A few weeks later our audio visual upgrade was complete when the streaming camera was installed. Now we can broadcast the service live on Facebook as well as send out the YouTube recording link.

Even with In-person worship starting, attendance was small due to many vulnerable to COVID-19 from our congregation who were being cautious and staying at home. We sensed those shut-in at home were needing a reminder of our love and God's presence. The Ad Council went into action to write note cards of encouragement and create "goody bags" with small tokens of love to be delivered to several members shut-in at home. Deliveries were made with masks on and social distancing, of course. We delivered goody bags once in the summer and once in the fall.

It seems that even a pandemic cannot stop the love of God or the ministry of this awesome congregation. Take that COVID-19! It is a blessing to be part of this wonderful group of Christian believers and I look forward to seeing what the future holds in 2021.

Servant Leadership Board for 2021




