Continuing the Conversation...

Jesus said, "'Love the Lord your God with all your passion and prayer and intelligence.' This is the most important, the first on any list. But there is a second to set alongside it: 'Love others as well as you love yourself.' These two commands are pegs; everything in God's Law and the Prophets hangs from them."

—Matthew 22:37-39 (The Message)

Jesus went right ahead and gave his charge: "God authorized and commanded me to commission you: Go out and train everyone you meet, far and near, in this way of life, marking them by baptism in the threefold name: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Then instruct them in the practice of all I have commanded you. I'll be with you as you do this, day after day after day, right up to the end of the age."

-Matthew 28:18-20 (The Message)

As I prepare to turn my calendar to October I am finding that as summer comes to a close, my days are already filling up quickly—not that my summer days were empty. There was a definite shift in our activities starting in September that coincides with children going back



to school and some of our young adults heading back to college. We can get very busy very fast.

At times like this, before we are in full-throttle speeding ahead mode, it is good to take some time to examine our church activities to determine if they are just filling time or if they are helping us to fulfill our purpose and mission as a church.

As I consider my quickly filling calendar I recalled the wisdom of a School for Ministry speaker a couple of years ago. The speaker, Tim Bias, helped my thought process along these lines as he guided the pastors in attendance back to the basics of being church by pointing out several paragraphs in our *United Methodist Book of Discipline* pertaining to the Mission and Ministry of the Church and then asking us to discuss some simple, but thoughtful questions.

I want to share some of this information with you here as we prepare for our annual church conference and planning for our future as a "vital" congregation. In paragraph 120 in our Book of Discipline we read that the mission of the United Methodist Church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. That shouldn't come as a big surprise since we have the opportunity to read those words every week before worship on the front of our bulletins. We are further reminded in this short paragraph, "Local churches provide the most significant arena through which disciple making occurs."

Disciple might be one of those churchy words that we hear and tune out without really thinking about what it means. So, for our purposes here, a disciple is a gracefilled Christ follower who puts faith into action

By grace I mean the undeserved favor and love of God that we cannot earn, that is always at work in our lives, and that we receive as a free gift. By grace-filled I mean knowing and accepting the favor and love of God working in our lives and offering it freely to all others.

The Book of Discipline then offers a Process for Carrying Out Our Mission (P 122) stating, "We make disciples as we:

• proclaim the gospel, seek, welcome and gather persons into the body of Christ; (Hospitality)

• lead persons to commit their lives to God through baptism by water and the spirit and profession of faith in Jesus Christ; (Offer Christ)

• nurture persons in Christian living through worship, the sacraments, spiritual disciplines, and other means of grace, such as Wesley's Christian conferencing; (**P**urpose)

• send persons into the world to live lovingly and justly as servants of Christ by healing the sick, feeding the hungry, caring for the stranger, freeing the oppressed, being and becoming a compassionate, caring presence, and working to develop social structures that are consistent with the gospel; (Engage) and

• continue the mission of seeking, welcoming and gathering persons into community of the body of Christ. (repeat)

If you like acronyms, here's the shorthand for the process we are called to use in carrying out our mission: Hospitality, Offer Christ, Purpose, Engage (see above). So we could say we are called to offer HOPE. A church that fulfills the mission of making maturing disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world by

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engaging this **HOPE** process is a good definition of a vital church.

As I consider our local church I can say without hesitation that we are a vital congregation. Does that mean we are done? We are good with where we are? NO! Becoming a vital congregation is not a destination that we finally arrive at; it is a journey we are on together in an ever-changing world. We can't decide we are fine just the way we are and expect to remain vital and purposeful.

It is extremely important to keep asking things like: Why do we do what we do? How is it helping to shape grace-filled followers of Christ? How might our church partner with other local organizations in our community to show the love of God? What do we need to do in our community that no one else is doing? Who are people who need us to show them the care and love of God through our actions? What will you do as a disciple so you can show others Jesus in your every-day life?

I leave you with these questions in hope of starting and continuing conversations that will lead to actions that will keep us a vital church making a positive difference in our community and the world. As part of this work we are in the process of exploring a new leadership model for our church—Accountable Leadership. This model has the potential for making better use of our human resources (fewer meetings, more efficient decision making) while still carrying on the important God-given ministries we do. Please plan to come to the Accountable Leadership training here in our fellowship hall on Saturday morning October 5, and bring your questions. We all need to understand well and agree on this move, we don't want to make this change lightly.

The Virtue of Giving...

"In all this I have given you an example that by such work we must support the weak, remembering the words of the Lord Jesus, for he himself said, 'It is more blessed to give than to receive." (Acts 20:35)

I recently came across a quotation by David Starr Jordan, founding President of Stanford University: "Wisdom is knowing what to do next; Skill is knowing how to do it, and Virtue is doing it." It caused me to think about how this applies to generosity.

Knowing That I Should Give: God calls us all to worship God and support the church. Stewardship is faithful management of all God gives us so that God can use our gifts to transform us spiritually and extend Christ's transforming love to others. We are told in Scripture that "God loves a cheerful giver" and that "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

Knowing How to Determine What I Should Give: Scripture informs us to love God and love others. Thus, we should divide our giving between the two. The amount to give to God through the church is the tithe, ten percent of our income. In order to reach the tithe, we should prayerfully consider what proportion of income to give, then strive to increase toward the goal of tithing, usually by about one percent of income per year. Although some of our tithe will go to the needy, we should consider another proportion of income to give to those in need.

The Virtue of Giving: The real issue is not whether we give 10%, but what we will do with the entire 100%. John Wesley believed in the spiritual discipline summed up as "earn all you can, save all you can, give all you can." Wesley believed that after earning money honestly and spending only what we need on our families and ourselves, we should give the rest away. Surely, using this approach, he would anticipate that our giving would be much more than the tithe of ten percent. His was.

For those of you who do not know, I have been involved in Monroe County jail ministry now for the last month. I am one of the Assistant Chaplains and provide one-on-one sessions with the inmates, Bible Study, and Sunday morning sermons.
