Continuing the Conversation...

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead...Therefore prepare your minds for action; discipline yourselves; set all your hope on the grace that Jesus Christ will bring you when he is revealed. Like obedient children, do not be conformed to the desires that you formerly had in ignorance. Instead, as he who called you is holy, be holy yourselves in all your conduct; for it is written, "You shall be holy, for I am holy." (1 Peter 1:3, 13-16)

With this letter comes the turning of our calendars to a new year. We know there will continue to be ups and downs and things we cannot control (as much as we might like to). We also know it will be another year of God's mercies, faithfulness, and grace as we move forward trusting God is with us always

and through everything.

This is also the time of year that we, as Methodists, traditionally renew our commitment to and covenant with God as Christ's servants. We will have an opportunity to do this as a congregation on January 9 as we focus on the baptism of Jesus and celebrate the baptisms of four young ladies in our worship service. You will be asked to remember your baptism (and all it means) and be thankful.

In that same service you will be invited to pray "A Covenant Prayer in the Wesleyan Tradition" from the UM Hymnal, as a way to guide you into this New Year. It is a prayer that demands deep commitment from us, so I want to spend a little time here giving you an opportunity to really take it in and consider it carefully before we pray it together. Below is the prayer followed by instruction on it from "The United Methodist Book of Worship."

A Covenant Prayer in the Wesleyan Tradition

2022

I am no longer my own, but thine. Put me to what thou wilt, rank me with whom thou wilt. Put me to doing, put me to suffering. Let me be employed by thee or laid aside for thee, Exalted for thee or brought low by thee. Let me be full, let me be empty. Let me have all things, let me have nothing. I freely and heartily yield all things to thy pleasure and disposal. And now, O glorious and blessed God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, Thou art mine, and I am thine. So be it. And the covenant which I have made on earth, Let it be ratified in heaven. Amen.

Invitation from our Book of Worship: "Commit yourselves to Christ as his servants. Give yourselves to him, that you may belong to him. Christ has many services to be done. Some are more easy and honorable, others are difficult and disgraceful...Be satisfied that Christ shall give you your place and work...

"To make this covenant a reality in your life, listen to these admonitions:

First, set apart some time, more than once, to be spent alone before the Lord; in seeking earnestly God's special assistance and gracious acceptance of you; in carefully thinking through all the conditions of the covenant; in searching your hearts whether you have already freely given your life to Christ. Consider what your sins are. Consider the laws of Christ, how holy, strict, and spiritual they are, and whether you, after having carefully considered them, are willing to choose them all. Be sure you are clear in these matters, see that you do not lie to God.

Second, be serious and in a spirit of holy awe and reverence.

Third, claim God's covenant, rely upon God's promise of giving grace and strength, so you can keep your promise. Trust not your own strength and power.

Fourth, resolve to be faithful. You have given to the Lord your hearts, you have opened your mouths to the Lord, and you have dedicated yourself to God. With God's power, never go back.

And last, be then prepared to renew your covenant with the Lord. Fall down on your knees, lift your hands toward heaven, open your hearts to the Lord."

As followers of Christ, there is much work to be done and as you can see from our Covenant Prayer and from 1 Peter 1 there are expectations for Christ followers. 1 Peter 1 reads in part: "prepare your minds for action; discipline yourselves; set all your hope on the grace that Jesus Christ will bring you when he is revealed. Like obedient children, do not be conformed to the desires that you formerly had in ignorance. Instead, as he who called you is holy, be holy yourselves in all your conduct..."

The good news for us is that Christ does the hard work of transformation in us... if we will only cooperate, for in Christ we are *new creations*! What will a renewal and recommitment to God look like in your life? I leave you for now with all these thoughts to ponder as we move into 2022.

Scarcity or Abundance? What are you looking for?

A few years ago, I read a fun book by A.J. Jacobs called *The Year of Living Biblically: One Man's Quest to Follow the Bible as Literally as Possible*. It's important to note that Jacobs, a journalist and author, is Jewish and agnostic. For one year, he tried to follow every biblical "rule" as literally as possible. This includes well-known rules like "Love your neighbor" and the Ten Commandments, as well as lesser-known commands to stone adulterers (which he does by throwing little pebbles at a rather cranky man he meets in a park who brags to Jacobs about an affair he is involved in). Jacobs also decided to follow the biblical instruction to tithe, deciding to give away 10 percent of his income.

After convincing his wife to join him, Jacobs gave the donations away to several charities electronically. He describes his experience this way, "The giving was painful. I mean, 10 percent? That would have an impact on our lives. Vacations would need to be scaled back; new furniture would have to wait. It was huge. When I pressed 'send' on the donations, my palms got wet, my heart rate spiked."

In giving, Jacobs felt the fear that is common to all of us. The fear of not having enough. However, that wasn't all he experienced. He continues:

"It was a pain mixed with pleasure. When the confirmation email pinged in, I felt good. There's a haunting line from the movie *Chariots of Fire*. It's spoken by Ian Charleson, who plays a deeply religious sprinter in the 1924 Olympics. He says: 'When I run, I feel his pleasure.' And as I gave away money, I think I might have felt God's pleasure. Which is odd. Because I'm agnostic. I don't know if there's a God or not, but still I've felt some high sense of purpose. It was like a cozy ember that started at the back of my neck and slowly spread its warmth through my skull. I felt like I was doing something I should have done all my life."

Ultimately, Jacobs' generosity changed him. I wonder, how our relationship with God and our lives might be vivified because of our giving.

We see the New Year as a new beginning, a chance to start over. But, many of us will soon fall back into our old patterns of living. Change is hard. So, each year we once again make New

Year's resolutions in a never-ending cycle.

Soul Food for Christmas

By Bishop Hee-Soo Jung

"...the glory of the Lord shone around them" (Luke 2:9b).



I have heard it said that the rabbis say, 'God created the human because God loves stories.' We are a people formed by stories, and the best of it is, that our story is big enough to save, heal, renew, and transform. This time of year, our services of worship often feature

the second chapter of Luke and our Christmas story finds the shepherds, working at night. The way Luke tells it, "the glory of the Lord shone around them" (Luke 2:9b). The word we render, 'glory,' comes from the Greek word, 'doxa.' 'Doxa' is used to describe dignity, honor, that which is worthy of devotion, glory. 'Doxa' comes from the root, 'doma,' which means, 'an apparent gift.' Our story says we are able to glimpse the dignity of God—and the giftedness of that dignity in a baby like us.

When we teach children the story, we often bring out a crèche and situate each character in a way that shows Jesus in the center. We try to teach children that this Jesus is born 'one of us.' I so appreciate Rev. Jorge Mayorga's recent devotion lifting a theme in Central American theologies that we have a Christ born as one of us. Yet there was no room for a poor Christ when they needed shelter to give birth to Jesus. Jesus at the center of the crèche forces us to meditate on a Christ of the poor sent to transform the whole creation.

We have a choice: we could make no room for the dignity of God or receive each other in ways that each act of love increases the glory of God. We don't have to go far to see the need for hospitality for Afghan refugees or for economic refugees. We will have red and blue at our Christmas tables, but if we live by our story, each act of love increases the glory of God in our midst. Please make time for the story in your Christmas festivities. In doing so, we put Jesus in the center again.

In Christmastide, we have the fullness of twelve days to reflect on our reception of the poor Christ, born one of us. Acts of love also consider dismantling systems that get in the way of racial justice and radical inclusion because we are here to receive each other in ways that increase dignity, the glory of God.

I would ask you to pray and consider the UMCOR disaster relief response for those in Kentucky and Middle America who suffered the extraordinary losses of recent tornadoes. **UMCOR number 901670 will route your gift to its proper impact.** Acts of love increase the glory of the Lord. Our story is big enough to save, heal, renew, and transform! Thank you for your faithful ministry. Know that I am praying for you.


