Continuing the Conversation...

"Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God." (Colossians 3:16)

"Count your blessings, name them one by one; Count your blessings, see what God hath done..." (Count Your Blessings, Johnson Oatman, Jr.)

As my favorite time of year finally begins to set in with cooler weather and more color, my joy was tempered with rising numbers of COVID cases; especially as they hit close to home. People are struggling with this illness (some losing their fight) and others are still fighting with each other. It continues to be ugly out there as people desperately grasp at some sort



of normalcy (at any cost). As I was ruminating over this recently, those words from that old hymn came to mind: "Count your blessings..."

At that point in my mood, I thought, "Yeah right! What good is that going to do?" It seemed at best an exercise in futility and at worst an empty cliché. But, those words weren't going to let me off the hook, "Count your blessings, name them one by one..." So, I sat with those words and opened my Bible.

As I searched Scripture and focused on the first verse of the hymn:

"When upon life's billows you are tempest tossed, When you are discouraged, thinking all is lost, Count your many blessings, name them one by one,

And it will surprise you what the Lord hath done" I came upon these words from James 1:12, "Blessed is the man who remains steadfast under trial, for when he has stood the test he will receive the crown of life, which God has promised to those who love him." I remembered that even though God does not promise a problem-free life, God promises blessing for those who endure life's trials trusting in God.

I also thought back on other times in my life when I felt down in the pits of despair where everything felt

wrong. If I let myself focus on everything that was wrong in life I tended to stay in the pits (not a place I recommend). But when I could start finding something "right" with life (even a small thing) and focus on that, my spirit would begin to lift.

For me this lifting often came with singing something like, "The joy of the Lord is my strength..." (which comes from Nehemiah 8:10) over and over until I felt that reality in my being. That really isn't an unusual phenomenon when you think of those words from Colossians 3:16: "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God." Singing those words from Scripture is like a healing balm to my soul.

By the time I got to the final verse of the hymn:

"So, amid the conflict, whether great or small, Do not be discouraged, God is over all; Count your many blessings, angels will attend, Help and comfort give you to your journey's end."

I was feeling my spirit lift to the point I could feel joy once again, even in the midst of life's challenges. As further encouragement, I came upon these words from Jeremiah 17:7-8: "Blessed is the man who trusts in the Lord, whose trust is the Lord. He is like a tree planted by water, that sends out its roots by the stream, and does not fear when heat comes, for its leaves remain green, and is not anxious in the year of drought, for it does not cease to bear fruit."

When we stay firmly grounded in a trusting relationship with the Triune God, we can continue to count our blessings even when blessings might seem rare. If you can only come up with one small blessing to count on any given day, name it and count it, trusting in God who has done great things and will continue to do so in God's perfect timing. I leave you with one final Scripture to hold on to as you "count your blessings."








Looking for a Unique Gift?


Any of these books would make wonderful gifts. Call the church office if you are interested in purchasing a book while they last.

Waiting Through the Season of Advent

The first Sunday of Advent falls on November 28 this year. The season of Advent is characterized by waiting—waiting upon the Lord for his presence to be revealed to us on Christmas. As we make our way through the season of Advent we will look back in Scripture at those who waited upon the Lord for his promises to come to pass through the Christ Child. We also look forward, contemplating how we should wait upon the Lord in this present moment of our lives, as God continues to make himself known to us.

November 28—Wait Upon the Lord with Faith (Galatians 3:8): Abraham and Sarah waited with faith for the birth of their son, Isaac, and we wait with faith for the birth of God's Son, Jesus, trusting that he will come at Christmas to save all people.

December 5—Wait Upon the Lord with Hope (Psalm 130:5): The prophet Isaiah declared the coming of the Lord, which gave the people of Israel hope for the future. We wait with hope for the future because we know what the future holds—a Savior.

December 12—Wait Upon the Lord with Rejoicing (Isaiah 25:9): Elizabeth rejoiced as she waited for the coming of her son, John the Baptist. And Mary rejoiced as she waited for the birth of her son, Jesus. In the same manner we rejoice as we wait for the coming of the Son of God.

December 19—Wait Upon the Lord with Gratitude (Psalm 9:1): Zechariah's waiting days for John the Baptist's birth were filled with great gratitude for the Lord's promise about to be fulfilled. In these remaining waiting days before our Savior's birth, we are ever more grateful for the arrival of the Promised One.



between knowing somebody well and being a genuine friend. The best proof of certifiable friendship is steadfast loyalty.

Our friendship with others should not lessen due to unforeseen circumstances. There is no one but Christ who merits unconditional friendship, but we should strive to be as Christ would have us to be.

Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. (1 Corinthians 13:4-7).

Being an individual that is accessible to help in the midst of pain or individual battles is vital. Such a large number of individuals are part-time, wavering, indecisive, or fair-weather companions.

They are the ones that stick around you when they obtain help from and receive benefits from the friendship and then they avoid you when they feel that they are not getting anything from the friendship. We need to think about our companions and survey our faithfulness to them. We should be the sort of friend that is true and faithful that the Bible empowers.

One who has unreliable friends soon comes to ruin, but there is a friend who sticks closer than a brother (Proverbs 18:24).

Forlornness or loneliness is widespread. Many individuals today feel cut off and estranged from others. Being in a group simply makes some individuals more mindful of their disengagement and their own isolation. These lonely individuals should not have to hear "have a pleasant day." They need companions who will stick close, tune in, care, and provide help when it is required, no matter what circumstances or challenges they may face.

What is better to have, one true companion or many shallow and superficial colleagues? Rather than wishing that we could discover a genuine friend, we should try to become one. There are individuals who need our true friendship, so we ought to request that God uncover them to us, and afterward step up and become that true and genuine companion. If we want to have faithful friends in this life, then we ought to present ourselves as friendly. "You are my friends if you do what I command" (John 15:14). "If you love me, keep my commands" (John 14:15).

There is a church hymnal song, "I'll Be a Friend to Jesus," that says:

"They tried my Lord and Master, with no one to defend; within the halls of Pilate, He stood without a friend... I'll be a friend to Jesus, my life for Him I'll spend; I'll be a friend to Jesus, until my years shall end."

There is another church hymnal song, "I Love the Lord, Down in My Heart," that says:

"I love the blessed Savior divine; He brightens up this pathway of mine, From His dear side I'll never depart; I'll follow wheresoever He leads, my soul each day He tenderly feeds, I love the Lord deep down in my heart... I love the Lord deep down in my heart, no earthly change can cause us to part; I've been made a child with a homeward start, I love the Lord deep down in my heart."

Are we truly friends with the Lord? Do we really love the Lord like we say we do? Do we do as He says and do what He says to do? If we say we are a friend of Jesus, then we should be. If we are not obeying Him, then maybe we are not a faithful friend?

Jesus states when questioned, that the greatest commandment in the Law was to "love thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind...and the second is this, love thy neighbor as thyself" (Matthew 22:36-40; Galatians 5:14).

Jesus is saying that if we really love God and our neighbor, we will want to keep the commandments. This is taking a positive look at God's law. Instead of stressing over all that we ought **not** to do, we should focus on all that we **can** do to show our affection for God and others.

When we are not inspired by love and affection, we become disparaging of others. We quit searching for the goodness in them and we begin to only see their faults.

Have we become guilty of only seeing the inadequacies or faults in others rather than their qualities?

So in everything, do to others what you would have them do to you, for this sums up the Law and the Prophets (Matthew 7:12).

This is what is commonly known as the Golden Rule, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you" (Luke 6:31). It is not difficult to avoid hurting others; it is harder to step up in doing something that benefits them. The Golden Rule as Jesus established is the basis of mercy and goodness that is active in its function, the type that God shows to us every single day.

We are forever owing a debt to Christ for the extravagant love he has spilled out on us. The only way we can start to reimburse this obligation, this debt, is by loving others.

Since Christ's love will consistently be boundlessly more noteworthy than our own, we will consistently have the commitment to love our neighbors, to love others.

Jesus does not leave an escape clause in the law of love. At whatever point love requires it, we are to go past human lawful prerequisites and abide by the God of love (Romans 13:8-10).

We must treat all people as we would want to be treated, regardless of their financial status. Do not show favoritism to the rich for what they can give us and ignore the poor for what little they can offer. We are equal in the eyes of God (James 2:8-9).

We are to love each other as Jesus loved all of us. He even gave His life for us.

Give all the love that we can and attempt to give more.




Did you know that when you shop for the holidays (or any time) at *smile.amazon.com/ch/39-6026139*, AmazonSmile donates to our United Methodist Church?

A Word of Wisdom from Bishop Jung

We know that God was in Christ, reconciling the world, and that relationship is the essence of transformation. We are changed by offering gifts in ways that serve each other. I am grateful for the gifted laity who lead and serve, and the dance of shared mission we discover when we deploy gifts in relationship with communities.



I write to thank you, clergy. Local Pastors, Deacons, Elders, and to you who may be spiritual leaders not yet with clergy credentials—but on the journey—thank you for your ministry!

God creates by speaking a new reality into being. God said, 'let there be light,' and there was light. Clergy, our words articulate God's newness in creation. We reset blessing in creation when we pronounce a benediction and say, 'may the Lord bless you and keep you.' We re-establish God's newness when we say, 'in the name of Jesus Christ you are forgiven.' We pronounce something irrevocable when you, say, 'I baptize you...' These are not just words, but language that paints God's possibilities over the worn-through grain of the world. The church is a language community establishing God's relentless solidarity interdependent good in a world that asserts self-interest as the way of the world...

I want you to know that clergy are paying the price of a politicized pandemic. They are exposing themselves to the harm of those who refuse to mask for their neighbor. They are trying to raise the level of maturity in Christian community so that Christ would be made known in our witness. They proclaim the Oneness of Christ in a world where powerful forces seek to divide us.

According to the Lewis Center for Church Leadership, nationally, young elders, those age 35 or younger, declined again in 2021 to 721—lower than the previous low of 852. There is a decline of young deacons since 2019 by 23%. 38% of Wisconsin clergy appointed to churches have been in their appointment three years or less—and they are trying to build pastoral relationships across a pandemic and via electronic means of communication...

Ministry has always been hard enough to require both lay and clergy to rely on God and disorienting enough for us to take God's hand whenever it comes. I offer ten concrete ways to show appreciation for your clergy person.

• Pray for your clergy persons. Deeply, earnestly, and honestly pray for their ministry.

- Advocate for an increase in compensation and work to improve your congregation's financial stewardship.
- Serve. Teach. Organize. Your service leads by example and blesses the body.
- Hold accountable gossip and complaining that does not address people directly.
- Visit someone who is grieving or sick or shut-in on behalf of the community of faith.
- Speak well of your pastor in the church and community.
- Reflect back to your clergy something specific that you appreciated about her or his ministry.
- Attend classes that your clergy person offers. Support them with your presence.
- Help others in your congregation respect the clergyperson's Sabbath day.
- Make sure your clergy person takes regular times of vacation and gets away for continuing education.

What you pay attention to grows. Pay attention to stewardship or mission or service—and they grow. Pay attention to the office of pastor or deacon and its value and impact will only increase—as will the people in that office. Thank you, each of you, for your ministry. Know that I am praying for you.


