Unpacking Burdens, Planting Hope: A Freedom Rooted in Christ

"Come to me, all you who are weary and carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest."

— Matthew 11:28 (CEB)

Dear Beloved Sparta UMC Family,

This July, as we walk through sun-drenched days and starry nights, our nation pauses to celebrate **Independence**

Day—a time when fireworks light the sky and flags wave high in tribute to freedom. But beneath the celebration, many hearts are heavy. We live in a time when fear has quietly crept into our lives—fear for the future, fear for our children, fear of division, war, loss, or simply the weight of too much change, too quickly.



This summer, our sermon series "There is Summer Baggage: Unpacking the Weights That Hold Us Back" offers us something more than reflection—it offers release. Jesus invites us not only to survive but to rest. Not just to carry on, but to lay down the invisible burdens that wear us thin. His words in Matthew 11:28 are like a cool breeze on a scorching day: "Come to me... and I will give you rest."

This is the freedom we most deeply need—not just political liberty, but the kind that comes from being set free from fear, shame, and striving. As John Wesley wrote, "Christian liberty is not a freedom from duty, but freedom *to* love, *to* serve, and *to* live holy lives." True freedom, is not found in doing whatever we want, but in becoming who we were created to be—people of courage, mercy, and purpose.

Adam Hamilton reminds us:

"God doesn't promise to take away every burden, but to walk with us and help us carry it. What He offers is peace in the storm, rest in the labor, and hope in the chaos."

This is the message we need to **plant like seeds**—into the soil of fearful hearts, into the fields of our community, into the souls of our children and elders alike. And just like seeds, it begins small:

- A kind word spoken.
- A shared prayer under a tree.
- A laugh over a meal at our July 2 Park Event.
- A young person feeling safe in church.
- An older friend hearing, "You still matter."

These are holy moments. They may seem ordinary, but they are how God waters weary hearts.

In Galatians 5:13, Paul tells us: "You were called to freedom... but don't use it for selfish gain. Serve one another in love." So as we unpack our summer baggage—anxiety, resentment, isolation—let us plant something new: courage, connection, and Christ-shaped community. Whether you're young or aging, tired or just beginning, you belong in this work of hope.

This July, may we choose to be **seed-planters of the Kingdom**. Let us be the people who lighten the burdens of others, who walk with the weary, and who proclaim—not with shouts, but with our lives—that **love is stronger than fear**, and that **Christ is still the hope of the world**.

In the warm light of grace and the freedom of Jesus, see you at worship, and in the park on July 2nd!

A Pastoral Word to the Sparta Women of Faith "Carrying Our Own Kind of Baggage"

["Come to me, all you who are weary and carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest."

— Matthew 11:28 (CEB)

Dear Sisters in Christ, in our July sermon series, "Summer Baggage: Unpacking the Weights That Hold Us Back," we've been naming the quiet, often unseen burdens we carry. And I want to take a moment to speak directly to you, the women of our church and friends—whether you are a mother or not, whether you work outside the home or within it, whether your hands are filled with caregiving or clasped in prayer.

Women carry their own kind of

weight. Sometimes it's hormonal, emotional, relational, or spiritual. Sometimes it's all of these wrapped in silence. There's the woman going through menopause, feeling like her body no longer follows predictable patterns. There's the **mother** whose children are growing up, walking out of the house, and sometimes away from the faith she planted. There's the woman sitting alone in a kitchen filled with memories, feeling the ache of the empty nest. There's the aging woman, still wise, still strong in spirit, but fighting the slow betrayals of her body. There's the woman whose health falters, and she wonders, "What can I still offer?" And there's the career woman, balancing faith and deadlines, or the stay-at-home mom, wondering if her life is still seen and her worth still spoken.

To all of you I say: **Jesus sees your baggage.** He doesn't tell you to hide it. He doesn't say "get over it." Instead, He whispers, "Come to me." Come with your tiredness, your questions, your regret, your longing, and even your laughter. Come with your hopes still rising, even if faint. **Jesus invites you to put the heavy bag down**—not because you're weak, but because you're loved.

Theologian **Kate Bowler**, who has lived with chronic illness, once wrote:

"God does not need you to be strong. God only asks you to turn to Him, even with tears in your eyes."

And **John Wesley** reminded his Methodist sisters and brothers that "*The world is our parish*," but **God is our source**. You are not defined by your productivity, your roles, your looks, or your achievements. You are defined by being **a beloved child of God**, fearfully and wonderfully made (Psalm 139:14).

This month, let the church be a safe space where you are free to feel what you feel—where grief has a name, and joy finds its song again. Let us be a community that **walks beside you**, prays for you, and lifts your arms when you're too tired to hold them up.

Whether you are starting a new season or letting go of one that has ended, **you are not alone**. In Jesus, you are accompanied by grace. As Methodist pastor and author **Elaine A. Heath** puts it:

"God speaks to women not as a separate class, but as bearers of light for the whole body."

So this July, dear woman of God, **you are invited to unpack your burdens**, release the fear that says, "*I am not enough*," and embrace the Savior who calls you by name.

We see you. We bless you. We walk with you. And most of all—Christ carries you.

"Grace Bowl" – Summer Restorative Quinoa Salad

Inspired by Matthew 11:28 – "Come to me... and I will give you rest."

Serves: 4 | Prep Time: 25 min | Dairy-free, Gluten-free, Heart-healthy

Ingredients:

- 1 cup quinoa (rinsed)
- 2 cups water

- 1 cup chickpeas (cooked or canned, rinsed and drained)
- 1 cup cherry tomatoes, halved
- 1 cucumber, chopped
- 1 avocado, diced
- 1/4 red onion, finely sliced
- ½ cup shredded carrots
- ½ cup fresh parsley or mint, chopped
- ¼ cup toasted sunflower seeds or slivered almonds
- 1 cup fresh spinach or baby arugula

Lemon-Turmeric Dressing:

- 3 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- Juice of 1 large lemon
- 1 teaspoon **honey** or maple syrup
- ½ teaspoon **turmeric powder** (antiinflammatory and healing)
- ½ teaspoon sea salt
- Fresh ground black pepper, to taste
- Optional: a pinch of cayenne for a gentle kick

1. Cook the Quinoa:

In a medium pot, bring quinoa and water to a boil. Reduce heat, cover, and simmer for 12–15 minutes, or until fluffy. Let it cool for a few minutes.

2. Prepare the Dressing:

In a small bowl or jar, whisk together olive oil, lemon juice, honey, turmeric, salt, and pepper. Set aside.

3. Assemble the Salad:

In a large bowl, combine the cooked quinoa, chickpeas, tomatoes, cucumber, avocado, red onion, carrots, and parsley.

4. Toss with Greens and Seeds:

Add in spinach or arugula and sprinkle with sunflower seeds or almonds. Pour the dressing over and gently toss.

5. Let It Rest:

Allow the salad to sit for 10–15 minutes before serving. This "rest" lets the flavors deepen—just like our souls when we pause.

♥ A Word of Blessing:

As you gather to eat, may this dish remind you that **rest is sacred**, and nourishment is more than food—it's also love, laughter, and presence.

Whether shared around a busy table or eaten in a moment of quiet - alone, may this Grace Bowl be a taste of the comfort Christ offers to every weary soul.

Annual Conference 2025 Report

June 5 - 8, 2025

"Grace is Sufficient"

The United Methodist Church Annual Conference was held in Middleton at the Marriot West Convention Center on June 5 - 8, 2025. It was an amazing gathering of clergy, laity, youth, and friends. There was worship, praise, connections, prayer, voting on resolutions and more. The conference was led by our new Bishop of the WI/NIL conference, Bishop Dan Schwerin. He was elected bishop in November 2022 and consecrated in January 2023. As a point of interest, his Haiku collection won the 2018 Haiku Foundation Touchstone Award. The newly formed WI/NIL conference has four divisions – Northeast, Northwest, Southwest and Southeast. There are 800 churches in our conference. We are in the Southwest division and our District Superintendent

is Rev. Amanda Stein. Bishop Schwerin started off

the conference with, "This is the year of Grace, let

us begin with gratitude for what God has given us.

Worship highlights were:

Bring hearts of appreciation."

- Bible Study: Dr. Ahyun Lee (previously a pastor at my hometown church in Mayville and currently at Garret Theological Seminary) led the Bible studies on Paul's letter in 2 Corinthians 12:9 "Grace is Sufficient."
- Retiree Recognition Service: There were 26 retirees recognized by Rev. Dan Dick. They ranged from 25 years of service all the way to 72 years of service.
- Ordination & Commissioning Service: led by Rev. Dr. Jerry Devine. There were 6 Deacons (One newly commissioned deacon, Jill Nolan, started her faith journey in my hometown, Mayville.)
 - There were 3 Elders
 - There were 4 certified Lay Speakers
 - There were 3 certified Lay Ministers
 - There were three transfers of ministers from other conferences
 - There were 8 newly ordained ministers
- Memorial Service: led by Bishop Dan Schwerin, a meaningful service to remember those clergy and spouses who passed this year.

Voting:

• 4 Constitutional Amendments were passed by a 2/3 majority. They will be recognized at the next General Conference of the United Methodist Church.

Other Statistics:

- There were 4 Wisconsin churches that closed their doors this year.
- The average church size is 94 and the median is 55 members
- 30% of churches can afford a full-time pastor.
- Memberships have dropped by 36% since 2018.
- 40 ministry grants were given out \$404,000.
- 50% of Wisconsin clergy were born outside of the United States.

The Delegation of Youth and Young Adults spoke:

They spoke of Real Connection, shared Faith and making their own decisions to get involved in the church. Outreach needs to bring the love of Christ in their lives so that Faith becomes personal. Spaces are needed that help them serve and grow. We heard about: Revive - a non-profit team of dedicated individuals who collaborate with faith-based organizations to reimagine their site use and configuration. Their focus is on sustainability and effectiveness, allowing these organizations to return to their core mission of ministry.

Highlights for me as an attendee of Annual Conference:

- I was able to sing with the 50 voice choir for the Ordination Ceremony. The choir was directed by Rev. Sangwook Park.
- I was able to connect with Rev. Rey Diaz who is out of retirement and serving at Fennimore. His family is doing well. He has 8 grandchildren and a new great grandson.
- I also connected with Rev. Dr. Hae Jung. She is in West Bend and says that things are going very well. It was a good move!
- I saw Pastor Loretta Waughtal. She is also out of retirement and serving Melrose.
- Many of you will remember Pat Spors. I sat
 with Pat for the duration of the conference.
 She is in Janesville. Their church is
 struggling financially as ours is, but they
 have an amazing mission program that send
 quilts, and needed items to churches all over
 the world. She is traveling to Africa soon on
 a mission trip.
- I enjoyed dinner two nights with Pastor Lourdes and David. It was a time of relaxation and connection.

The 2025 Annual Conference offered a rich blend of worship, governance and fellowship anchored by the theme, "Grace is Sufficient." Highlights included ordained clergy, memorial moments,

retiree recognition and engagement with critical denominational amendments. The conference fostered renewal, connection and clarity moving into another year of ministry. (To read all the materials go to

["The Silent Weights Men Carry":

"Come to me, all you who are weary and carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest."

— Matthew 11:28 (CEB)



Dear Brothers in Christ,

I want to speak directly to you, the men of our church—fathers and grandfathers, single and married men, hard workers, quiet listeners, veterans, visionaries, and faithful volunteers.

You carry weight too. But often, you carry it in silence.



The pressure to "be strong" can be unrelenting. There are men in our pews and out there who are wrestling with what it means to grow older—to be respected, yet overlooked. There

are men managing **health concerns** they rarely speak of. Others feel the **financial pressures of providing**, or the invisible burden of always needing to "have it together."

Some of you are looking at a career that no longer fulfills you—or a life that hasn't turned out the way you hoped. Some of you are quietly grieving—for a parent, a spouse, a dream, or for children who've grown distant. Others carry **guilt** over things done or left undone, words spoken or withheld.

To all of you, Jesus says: "Come to me." Come not because you are failing—but because you are human. You were never meant to carry it all alone.

Adam Hamilton writes.

"So many men have been taught to hide their fear, their sadness, even their love. But Jesus never asked for silent strength. He asked for trust."

And **John Wesley**, though often remembered for his intellect and action, never stopped emphasizing the **heart of faith**—a personal, healing encounter with God. He preached not just to save the mind, but to **set the soul free**. That includes your soul, brother.

Men often feel they must *do* something

to be valuable.

But Christ's invitation in Matthew 11 is not, "Do more," but rather, "Come to me." You matter—not for what you produce, fix, or protect—but because you are God's beloved son.

So, let me say to you:

- You are more than your job title.
- You are not alone in your quiet fears.
- You are not less of a man for needing help.
- You are seen.
- You are strong—not because you carry everything—but because you have the humility to lay it down at Jesus' feet.

The church needs men who will pray boldly, confess honestly, mentor wisely, love deeply, and lead gently. Whether you're a 20-year-old seeking direction, a 50-year-old bearing the burdens of work and family, or an 80-year-old wondering what's next—you still have a role in God's story.

As theologian **Howard Thurman** once wrote: "Don't ask what the world needs. Ask what makes you come alive, and go do it. Because what the world needs is men who have come alive."

Let this July be a moment of renewal. Join us in worship. Come to the park on July 2. Reach out to a brother in Christ. Let's stop pretending we don't

need each other—and remember that the strongest men are those who walk in grace.

Lay down the heavy weights. Pick up faith. And find your rest in Christ.

Hey there, Summer is supposed to be all fun—right? Sun, games, friends, late mornings. But if we're being real, summer can also come with its own baggage. That's what we've been talking about in church—how we all carry things in our hearts that no one else may see.

You're Not Alone! And I want you to know this: your baggage matters.



Many times You carry a baggage full of frustrations, fears, pain, decisions. Sometimes you have to besides coupling with your full baggage, have to couple also with the adult's heavy baggage as you watch parents spliting up, maybe trying to figure out how to live in two different houses. Others,

carry a baggage of missing a parent who's far away working abroad or in another state or city, others serving the country—maybe deployed. Some just come to church because your grandparents bring you while parent's are working unable to come with you. That can feel awkward, or even lonely. — Matthew 11:28 (CEB)

Jesus sees you. He knows exactly what you're carrying—even the things you don't talk about. He says to you, "Come to me." Not, "Fix yourself first." Not, "Wait until your family's perfect." Just: "Come."

And here at Sparta UMC?

This is your place too. Your life situation doesn't disqualify you. In fact, your courage to show up, to sing, to learn, to be here—it makes this church stronger. We love you!

Pastor and author **Adam Hamilton** once wrote: "The Church is at its best when it welcomes the broken and walks with the wounded."



That includes you. Whatever you're facing—sadness, confusion, anger, questions about God—you don't have to carry it alone. This summer, Jesus wants to give you rest. Real rest. Peace inside. Strength for the next step.

So keep coming. Keep asking. Keep being you. Whether you're 13 or 18, you are part of this church. Whether your parents come or not. Whether you're struggling or smiling. Whether you feel faith or are just figuring it out.

We're so glad you're here. And remember, **you're never walking alone.**

Summer Baggage & Supper Grace: A Letter to Our Soup & Supper Friends

Theme Verse: "Come to me, all you who are weary and carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest." – Matthew 11:28 (CEB)

Dear Soup & Supper Friends,



Every Tuesday evening, as you walk through the doors of our church and come to our fellowship Hall, something sacred happens. It's more than soup. It's more than bread. It's more than conversation. It's a shared journey—a place where burdens are acknowledged, not ignored; where stories are held with tenderness, not judgment; and where hope, like a good warm meal, is served freely.

This summer, our church has been talking about "Summer Baggage: Unpacking the Weights That Hold Us Back." We've all got baggage. Some of it we've carried for years—grief, guilt, poverty, fear, addiction, loneliness. Others carry rejection from places that should've been safe—like family, or even churches. Maybe you've felt that sting. Maybe you've been made to feel like you didn't belong. But not here.

Here, you are *seen*. You are *valued*. And you are *loved*.

Jesus said, "Come to me, all you who are weary..." That means you. The one who barely made it through the day. The one tired of pretending. The one who wonders if anyone cares. The one who keeps getting knocked down but still shows up. That kind of strength is sacred.

Every time you sit down with us on Tuesdays night, you teach us something about courage. You remind us what real community looks like—not fancy or perfect, but honest and full of grace.

So this summer, let's make a deal. Let's not hide our baggage. Let's bring it to the table—yes, even the invisible kind. Let's make space for each other's messiness and stories. Let's find rest in Jesus who doesn't ask us to clean ourselves up before coming, but welcomes us as we are—hungry, weary, and hoping.

You are part of this family. Not because you earned it. Not because you paid for it. But because grace made room for you.

And if this is a hard week, know this: You're not alone. You're carried in prayer. You are believed in. And we're saving you a seat at the table.






