Continuing the Conversation...

"Consider then the parable of the farmer... As for what was planted on good soil, this refers to those who hear and understand, and bear fruit and produce—in one case a yield of one hundred to one, in another case a yield of sixty to one, and in another case a yield of thirty to one." (Matthew 13:18...23)



We are in the season of Lent; a season that calls us to reflect on transformational change as we move toward Easter. Springtime is lush with rebirth, new beginnings, and new growth. Too often, however, in our hurry up world, we want to race to the Easter Resurrection without fully embracing the Lenten

journey that leads there.

Lent reflects the forty days that Jesus wandered in the wilderness — tempted by Satan — in readiness for a ministry destined to end, by human standards, in tragedy. Few of us can relate to the level of sacrifice and commitment that Jesus displayed in his forty days, yet Lent provides us with an opportunity to deepen our spirituality by engaging in regular spiritual disciplines from Ash Wednesday through Easter Sunday. The wilderness — the desert days of Lent — is the sure path toward spiritual transformation.

As I read a reflection on Lent and Easter by Rev. Dan Dick, I thought about the transformation that is ongoing in my life as well as the life of the church. Dick shared that the metaphor of the seed helps us "embrace the wilderness and prevents us from racing to Easter."

Jesus began his teaching ministry with the parable of the sower (you can read the entire parable in Matthew 13). He referred to seeds and trees, fruit and branches, throughout his ministry. To receive the metaphor of Christian growth and spiritual development contained in a seed is to learn valuable lessons about change and transformation for our personal lives as well as for our life together as Christ's church. I found these six lessons

from the seed helpful as I contemplate the transformation I am undergoing. I invite you to prayerfully consider these lessons so that they might grow to full bloom in your heart.

Lesson One: Seeds Need a Rich Environment

Seeds require a rich, healthy environment in which to grow. The same is true for the environment in which we grow as Christian disciples. There must be an ongoing flow of comfort and security, challenge and inspiration, learning and service. Without such an environment, discipleship growth is stunted, stagnant, or worse, dead. We create an environment for our spiritual formation through prayer, study, worship, fellowship, and service.

Lesson Two: Seeds Can't Be Rushed

You cannot rush the normal growing process. Seeds require the amount of time that they require. In God's plan, the time things take is the right time. People, however, get impatient. Our culture puts pressure on us to rush through everything. We live in an age of instant gratification. Seeds teach us that we need to learn to wait, to develop patience. Christian formation is a process of seed-like growth. Patience is the key ingredient to transformational growth.

Lesson Three: All Seeds Grow at Different Rates

Plant a package of seeds, and immediately you see diversity in the rate of growth. Some sprout almost immediately and begin a steady rate of growth. Late sprouters often become early bloomers. And some normal beginners end up stunted and sickly. Growth is rarely even, and it is often chaotic. The seed teaches us that to mature in different ways at different times is the only true normal.

Lesson Four: Change Happens in Stages

Examine any plant as it grows from seed to maturity, and you will find that it is hard to believe you are looking at the same plant. While the growth follows a smooth process, it proceeds through distinct stages. These stages are marked by unique characteristics and are a measure for the relative health and well-being of the plant at any given time. Our spiritual development progresses through stages as well. Belief and inquiry deepen to devotion and discipleship. Learning and following evolve into teaching and leading. Growth within the community of faith matures to a life of

service in the world. We move through ages and stages of faith development as we grow from seed to sapling to fruit-bearing tree.

Lesson Five: Seeds Contain the Past and the Future

Each seed is the product of previous generations and contains within it all the genetic code for the future. Seeds are filled with the information that yields transformation. Each generation builds upon the last and lays the foundation for the next generation. The Word of God is the information we contain — passed down throughout the ages and preserved in us for the future — that holds the power to transform us. When we give ourselves time to grow, we unleash the God-given power to become mature Christian disciples.

Lesson Six: Seeds Have a Purpose Larger Than Themselves

Growth is not the purpose of a seed, but a means to an end. Unless seeds give rise to new seeds, they fail to fulfill their purpose. Transformation never happens for its own sake. Change happens to lead us to a new place. Growth occurs that we might not only know more, but that we might do more. Seeds are judged, ultimately, on the fruit that they bear.

Christians may never content themselves with growing in their knowledge and love of God just for the sake of knowledge. Growth that fails to lead to a change in behavior is not healthy. We grow for a reason, and that reason is something much larger than any individual's needs.

The lessons of the seed help us see Lent, not as a time of sacrifice and denial, but as a time of preparation and anticipation—preparation for the work to which God calls us and anticipation of the fullness of life that God promises. Let's continue growing in God's time.

A Lenten Journey through the Gospel of Luke

Our Wednesday evening Lenten discussion continues with Pastor Adam Hamilton's study, *Luke: Jesus and the Outsiders, Outcasts, and Outlaws*. We are meeting in the chapel on Wednesdays at 6 p.m. throughout Lent as we explore the story of Jesus as found in the Gospel of Luke. Hamilton highlights some of Jesus' "friends in low places." The hope is you will come to see just how important this theme is to Luke.

You are encouraged to read through the Gospel of Luke with a 40-day reading plan that is available at the church. Each daily reading will take less than 15 minutes. Here is how we will progress through Lent with Luke:

March 1: Simon, Do You See this Woman? we'll turn to Luke's emphasis on Jesus' ministry with and for women including the demon-possessed Mary of Magdala with the voices in her head, the sinful woman who wept at Jesus' feet...trying to understand how Jesus saw a woman's role in his ministry.

March 8: Parables From the Underside, we'll consider Jesus' parables and how often in Luke Jesus makes the sinners, the sickly, the tax collectors, and the Samaritans the heroes of his stories, and the religious hypocrites the villains.

March 15: On the Journey to Jerusalem, we'll turn to Jesus' final journey to Jerusalem, a journey that takes up nearly half of the Gospel. On this journey, Jesus ministered to Samaritan lepers, a chief tax collector named Zacchaeus, and others who were outcasts, outsider, and outlaws to their people, climaxing with his dramatic statement, "the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost" (Luke 19:10).

March 22: The Final Week, we'll turn to the events of Holy Week as Jesus entered Jerusalem "humble and riding on a donkey" (Matthew 21:5). There he overturns the tables of the wealthy and powerful merchants in the Temple, praises a poor widow who gave her last "mite" in her offering to God. At the Last Supper, Jesus addresses a debate among his disciples about which one of them was the "greatest."

March 29: Crucified with the Outlaws, we'll turn to the crucifixion of Jesus, and the words Luke records Jesus saying from the cross—words that only appear in Luke's Gospel: from the cross, Jesus prayed for the forgiveness of his abuses, offered salvation to an outlaw, and then entrusted his life into his Father's hands.

I look forward to the discussion we will have as we participate in this overview of Luke's Gospel for Lent.

We will meet at the Monroe County Justice Center on Court Street at 11 a.m. and will make stops throughout town as we go through the 14 Stations. At noon there will be a service of The Seven Last Words of Christ inside Lanham Schanhofer's Funeral Home. Both of these opportunities will be meaningful ways to commemorate the events of Good Friday and are open to the community. Come to one or both and reflect on the sacrificial love of God for you.



Confirmation Update

We have also been discussing "Who is God and who God isn't" before moving on to a discussion of prayer. I have to brag on the confirmands a little here: they are some awesome pray-ers. Most recently we have been discussing what it means to be created "in the image of God" and "sin and grace."

We have been having great discussions on some pretty deep topics. I have been excited these past few months to witness the growth in these students. As they continue through this journey of confirmation you will see them helping with more active roles in worship and other ministries as they figure out what role in the church they would like to take on as they start their faith journey as potential members of this congregation.

What Do You Really Want?

"He who loves money will not be satisfied with money . . ." (Ecclesiastes 5:10)

Many people will say that they want more money. But, the truth is that's not what people really want. As far as I know, we still cannot eat money, make clothes from it, or build a house with it. If we were stranded on a deserted island, it would be practically useless to us.

No one really wants money. Instead, they want what they think it will provide for them. For some people, more, nicer, newer stuff; others want the sense of security or power they think it provides.

I would argue that, until we understand what motivates our desire for money, we won't be at peace in our relationship with it.

This Lenten season, I would encourage you to take time to figure out your money motivation by taking a simple "Money Motivation Quiz." There are copies available in the office; no one will know your results but you. As the quiz notes, none of the motivations are inherently good or bad, but each does have a "dark side". More than just allowing us to lean into the positive parts of our motivation and avoid the dark side, knowing that people may have different motivations regarding money than we do, will help us when we deal with money in our relationships.

Ultimately, we believe that loving God and loving our neighbor as ourselves is our greatest priority. It is always easier to do so when we know ourselves well.




