Continuing the Conversation...



"Come, follow me," [Jesus] said, "and I'll show you how to fish for people." Right away, they left their nets and followed him.

-Mark 1:17-18

Jesus came near and spoke to them, "I've received all authority in heaven and on earth. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations,

baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to obey everything that I've commanded you. Look, I myself will be with you every day until the end of this present age."

—Matthew 28:18-20

As a young Christian I was touched by Jesus' call stories of "follow me." I can't say I was as quick as the first disciples to immediately drop everything and follow Jesus, but I was willing to follow. And I really wanted to get better at following...I just wasn't quite sure how to do that. Looking back I can see I had so much to learn and I didn't have the right tools or focus in my attempts at following Jesus.

At that point in my life I attended worship fairly regularly, I taught various age groups of Sunday school, I listened to several radio pastors (some giving conflicting messages), I tried to attend Bible studies when they were offered, I helped in the church kitchen and with fundraisers as I could. And I did begin to learn—although not all of it was positive.

I was very haphazard in my attempts to follow. I was flitting about from this to that and wondering why I didn't seem to be growing much as a disciple—one who follows. Even after growing in my relationship with God enough to discern the further call, "go, and make disciples," I have continued to struggle with just how to do this.

When I had the opportunity to participate in the Institute for Congregational Development (ICD) I came to realize that an important element missing from my desire to more faithfully follow Jesus and to go and make disciples was intentionality in all that I do. Without intentionality and clear and focused goals it is too easy to get carried away, pulled this way and that, by too many seemingly good opportunities.

I have been in conversation with our Staff/Pastor Parish Relations Committee and our Ad Council chair, Toni Burrows, and many others about our need for focus and intentionality in planning our ministries. Other members have shared how they have heard this same message of a need for intentionality and focus through other venues. The Holy Spirit is moving and we are paying attention.

Some things that have come out of these discussions that I find really exciting are: first, Toni has begun a discussion with Ad Council members about updating our ministry plan. The initial plan gives us a good foundation and there were many positive changes that came about through this plan. Members at our most recent meeting were sent home with a copy of that plan and asked to prayerfully and intentionally review it and then come back next month ready to share ideas on where we go next to become a growing and more vibrant church. I asked people to consider how their ideas could be SMART (Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, Time-based) goals. That way we have intentional goals we can work toward and not just wishes. I am very excited for our next meeting!

Another exciting outcome of these conversations is that our S/PPRC chair, John Lodico, recommended to the Ad Council that we pursue learning more and moving toward an Accountable Leadership model instead of our current committee and board structure of church leadership. There is still much to learn, but the short story is the Accountable Leadership model cuts down on committees and meetings, saving on our human resources and time spent in multiple meetings. I am not against committees and meetings per se, but I think it is wise to be very intentional in how we use our time when so many things already compete for our limited time. After hearing John's summary, a motion was made, seconded, and approved unanimously to move forward with exploration. I will be attending an information session at annual conference in June and in the meantime begin reading information I received from a colleague who is leading his church through this change.

Finally, I caught Lynn Humphrey's excitement as she gave a brief report on a lay servant class she attended on prayer. A big take away I got from Lynn went back again to intentionality. She experienced some great discussion on being intentional in prayer and just what that might look like in our congregation. Prayer is such an important part of our ministry together it only makes sense that it should be intentional and specific. I cannot wait to talk to her more and see where God leads us as a church in this aspect of our ministry together!

These are just three recent examples of fruitful conversations I have enjoyed. I cannot wait to see where we go from here and I look forward to hearing from you. If you were not at the last Ad Council meeting and would like to be part of the conversation on our ministry plan, please stop in my office and pick up a copy of the old ministry plan for review and input. You are all such an important part of this process of becoming maturing disciples and making maturing disciples because you this Body of Christ—have unique gifts and stories of who you are in relation to God and how we do ministry together. Your story needs to be recognized and honored as we invite others to join us on this discipleship adventure. I am very excited about this opportunity we have to grow together and share with others.

God Loves a Cheerful Giver

"Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to bless you abundantly, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work."

(2 Corinthians 9:7-8)

The apostle Paul reminds us of the Law of the Harvest: "whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously." How simple is that. Each year, every farmer has the same choice. Consume all the seed as food or give some back to the soil to ensure next year's harvest.

And the same is true with the spiritual harvest where our seeds are our good works, financial giving, prayers, study, service, and worship. If one's return is determined by his or her investment, then no farmer would sow sparingly or haphazardly and expect a beautiful, bountiful harvest. And neither should we.

The Law of Spirituality is as certain as the law of nature: When we live in the world of the flesh, we are tempted to withhold from God and withdraw from helping others. When we feel God's abundance, however, we know and experience a bountiful return.

Additionally, God does not value gifts given reluctantly or under compulsion. We feel loved by God every day when we receive God's gifts, of life and food and family and work, or at least we should. But, does God feel loved when he receives our gifts? Or, is he offended by the spirit in which they are given? That is what it means to be a cheerful giver. We give because we love the recipient.

In a survey, American teens were asked when they were most likely to talk with their parents: dinner was their top answer. Kids who eat dinner with their parents experience less stress and have a better relationship with them. This daily mealtime connection is like a seat belt for traveling the potholed road of childhood and adolescence and all its possible risky behaviors.

AND...food is always a blessing. When we have food on the table to feed our family and friends, that's a big blessing from the Lord. It is important to always remember Him before eating, to show thanks and appreciation for His provision. Thank You!

Trustees Report...

There are several projects that still need to be completed after the Parsonage renovations. John Lodico will be finishing the trim work in the kitchen and venting the dryer in the new laundry room. Pastor Loretta thanked John for fixing a curtain rod. Lanny Deiters is scheduled to redirect and replace a heat register in the parsonage kitchen on April 16th.

The Trustees will do a walk around the church and parsonage at the May meeting to assess our needs for spring clean-up and beautification. After the outside needs are listed, we will try to schedule work days or evenings and ask for volunteers to handle specific projects.

Placement of handicap parking areas was discussed and all were in agreement that spaces on each side of the west entrance be requested. Pete Foss has contacted the city (Mark Van Wormer) and will get pictures and descriptions created. Pete and/or Gary Ascher will make a presentation at the Public Works meeting as soon as possible.

Plaster is falling in corners of the Balcony ceiling in the Sanctuary and it doesn't seem to be from moisture. We need to look into how/when this can be repaired. Pastor recently noticed the same problem in the Youth Room.

The ceiling leaks in The Gathering Place have stopped with the melting of the snow off the roof. Gary Ascher is going to contact a contractor to look at it.

The porch roof on the parsonage needs to be fixed and the eaves trough above the parsonage's back door leaks. Trustees will address the porch roof and Pete Foss will fix the eaves trough when the weather is better.

The pop machine in Fellowship Hall is freezing up. Pete Foss called Pepsi and they will send a repair person to fix or replace the machine.

Administrative Church Council Report

John reported that Dave Kemp has been out due to an illness. Pete Foss and John Lodico have been stepping in to cover for him. Council was asked to keep Dave in their prayers for a speedy recovery.

Paul Foulke reported that offerings have been decent, with a check book balance of \$14,373. Lenten offerings have raised \$1600 for the Ecumenical Food Pantry so far. The Finance committee did not meet in April. The Stewardship Task Force will meet on May 16th@ 6:00pm. The church received a thank you from the conference for apportionments paid.

John reported that the Staff Pastor Parish Relations Committee (SPPRC) has been looking into the Accountable Leadership Plan. The committee would like to move forward in exploring the One Board Plan. This Plan would combine Finance, Trustee, SPPRC, and the At-Large Church Council all into one Board. It was decided to further study the Accountable Leadership Plan.

Margie Lakowske reported that the Membership Committee is working on updating the church membership. They have found that some folks have fallen through the cracks over the years. Pastor Loretta has sent out 40 letters to introduce herself and ask for feedback or to share a memory. Pastor Loretta has not yet heard back from any of the letters she sent out.

Margie Lakowske also reminded us that the UMW Salad Luncheon will by Thursday, April 25th from 11am to 1 pm.

Lynn Humphrey reported that she and Larry had purchase some new furniture to update two of the classrooms. The BASH kids will be singing on May 12th and will be handing out flowers to mother's on Mother's Day. On April 24th the BASH kids will be packing hygiene kits for kids so Pastor Loretta can take them to Annual Conference. The last night of BASH for this academic year will be May 15th.

Margie Lakowske reported that the History & Records Committee met on April 17th. She shared that on May 5th there will be an insert in the bulletin on the History of the Parsonage.

Pictorial directory sign-up is going well, but there is a need for volunteers to serve as host/hostess on April 30th from 3:30 to 6:30 and on May 4th from 1:30-5:30pm. Margie said these shifts could be broken up and done by several people, if needed. Cindy Isensee has been doing a wonderful job getting people signed up for pictures.

Cyndi Wise was unable to attend the meeting, but sent in a report. She wanted to thank Lynn and Larry Humphrey for their purchase of the new curtains, 2 round tables, 2 small tables, and 2 bookcases for the BASH classrooms. Cyndi also thanked everyone for

faithful participation during the Lenten Season and Holy Week.

Paul Foulke reported that the Mission Outreach Committee received money to purchase supplies for the Annual Conference Kits. The church has also been asked to donate \$300 for the Walk through the Bible event to be held at Sparrows Nest. This committee will meet to approve payment of that request through Mission funds. Bev Donahue, Church Treasurer, reported that there was some money sitting in the Global Missions account and wants to know where it was supposed to go.

Pastor Loretta shared that the "24 Hours that Changed the World" Lenten Service is now finished. The Noon Ecumenical Luncheons and Devotions were well attended and very interesting.

There will be a Maundy Thursday Service on April 18th at 7pm and on Good Friday there will be a Prayer Walk ending at the Funeral Home. On May 17th she will be doing a Quarterly Memorial Service at the Morrow Home. On May 19th she will be doing an infant and mother baptism and on the 2nd Thursday of the month she will be doing a communion service at the Morrow Home. She has also been speaking with 2 people who want to become members and a young couple about getting married.

Priscilla Hemmersbach reported that the Health Ministry will be highlighting shut-ins in the upcoming issues of *The Chimes*. These will be included in the Congregational Connections articles. She and the rest of the Health Ministry Team have been doing a lot of visits. She has been visiting and will be giving Sarah Johnson a prayer shawl. Pricilla has been doing Quarterly Memorial Services out at Rolling Hills.

A Pizza and a Movie night has been scheduled for April 27th at 6:00pm.

There was discussion about the "Simple Church". Pastor Loretta handed out an old 4 Year Ministry Plan and challenged the committee to read it over and come back with new ministry goals. At next month's meeting the group will choose goals they feel are priorities and set a time frame in order to accomplish them.

Toni Burrows talked about the Evangelism Seminar she attended where Rev. Randy Larson was the speaker. She came back with some good ideas that she will be sharing.

Pastor Loretta handed out a list of "50 ways to Welcome New People" and asked us to read through it as we consider our ministry goals.

Lynn shared her thoughts about trying Intentional Prayers for the church's needs.

Summer Volunteers in Mission Trip



If anyone is interested in going on this Volunteers in Mission trip to United Methodist Children's Services in Milwaukee during July 29 –

August 2, 2019 please talk to Pastor Loretta about registering as soon as possible.

Pastor has been on this trip twice in the past and found it a very worthwhile experience. If you have questions or are interested in going talk to Pastor as soon as possible so she can answer questions and discuss registration and carpooling if you decide to go.

This will be a return trip by VIM to a very worthy agency on the front line of efforts to deal with folks with major life issues relating to poverty and lack of basic life opportunities. This is always a rewarding trip as the agency has been in existence and grown in service for years and is very dynamic in the community there. There is a variety of jobs to be done depending on your physical ability and skill level. This will be an adult/youth trip.

The United Methodist Children's Services is located in the Washington Park area of Milwaukee. The Washington Park Neighborhood is one rich with history. A community that came to be through the development of both a city park and industrial growth, Washington Park carries a legacy of a diverse community of people from all walks of life, with the city park as a cornerstone of the community.

But Washington Park faces challenges too, and they are ones that reflect many other parts of the city of Milwaukee. With an unemployment rate of over 15%, and almost 50% of the population living below the poverty line, families in this neighborhood struggle with finding a sense of stability and hope.

The **cost is \$150 (\$30/day)** which includes your meals and lodging (in the past we have stayed in a large church and slept on cots or air mattresses that we bring. Daily rate and daily participation will be encouraged as well.

A three day minimum participation is suggested. Deposit of \$30 is due with your registration form as soon as possible. Final payments are **due by July 15**, **2019**. Checks should be made out to WAC/VIM Camp.

Creating a Culture of Permanent Growth

Over the course of the last three years, the conference has provided the opportunity to laity and pastors for a year-long leadership development opportunity known as the Institute of Congregational Development (ICD). Participants learned from prominent pastors, authors, coaches, and consultants from across the nation, and from each other as they were stretched out of their comfort zones.

This year, while ICD is on hiatus, the New Ministries Strategy Board and the office of Congregational Development are offering four follow-up events to graduates of ICD. These training events are also open to other clergy and laity with passion for starting new ministries. The trainers will be provided by Discipleship Ministries and Path 1.

May 7, 2019: Strategies and Strengths Discovery Day for Planting New Ministries - Participants will be introduced to the Change Your Ministry Pastoral Assessment which looks at key areas of ministry grouped around church, culture, and change. They will discover their preferred role for innovation, learn about creating a healthy leadership team, and focus on the skills and leadership styles best suited for creating new faith communities.

November 12-13, 2019: Launchpad - In an effort to provide training reflective of planting experiences with more missional approaches, we offer a year-long process for planters and their teams called Launchpad. These events mark the beginning of the process. During training planter leaders and their teams will sketch out ministry plans for the next nine months, considering both attractional and missional ministry elements.
