Continuing the Conversation...

Greetings friends, grace and peace to you. As we turn our calendars to June I want to give you a snapshot of what the Servant Leadership Board and I have been up to. In April four of us were able to participate in a workshop for all churches that have moved to the accountable leadership structure (what we call our

Servant Leadership Board).

The workshop, entitled Being the Church in a Post-Pandemic World, was led by Kay Kotan. Kay is a renowned author, speaker, and church coach. The workshop led us through her book, Being the Church in a Post-Pandemic World. Those attending the workshop thought it was so helpful in our work of ministry planning that we will be going through the eight intentional, strategic steps provided in the book with the rest of the Servant Leadership Board as we take extended time over the summer to work on updating our ministry plan. The eight steps are: flexibility, relational, vision, spiritually grounded, commitment, innovative, resilience, and courage. We agreed we will need all of these things to be a vital and growing church going forward and are thankful for the resource. If you are interested, the book is available on Amazon and other book sellers.

Through the workshop we were challenged to ask and answer some challenging questions. Kay invites us outside our comfort zones, declaring that as the church begins to emerge from the pandemic, our role is changing. It was already changing pre-pandemic, but the change is sure to escalate drastically post-pandemic.

Being The Church in a Post-Pandemic World is designed to serve as a guide to what conversations might be helpful for you and your church's leadership. This book is to be used as a tool, not an instrument of judgement or criticism. This resource was created out of a heart full of love for the local church and the hope it will be helpful in finding our next faithful steps to being the vital church in the post-pandemic world. If any of you reading this would like to be further involved in the conversation please let me know.

The workshop happened to coincide with the sermon series I had already planned on "Redeeming the Routines of Life." I hope the series was meaningful for you and caused you to pause and consider priorities and where God may be inviting you to a closer walk with him and what that might mean for us as a community of faith here in Sparta. I know as I researched for the series it gave me much to ponder and work on in my own life.

At the end of the final sermon in the series everyone in attendance was given a "Leisure Survey" to complete. The results will be tabulated and used by the Servant Leadership Board in our planning for future ministries. Hopefully we will even see some of the fruits of the survey this summer.

If you weren't in attendance in worship to complete the survey, fear not! A copy of the survey is included with *The Chimes*. Just fill it out and return it to the church office before June 15.

God's power is at work here. We just need to be diligent in our listening, our praying, and our actions as we reach out with love to each other and the community to make new and maturing disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

Good

To be a follower of Jesus means to be willing to sacrifice ourselves for the good of all. It means to be willing to deny ourselves for the benefit of all of humanity.

I recently read about a man named Thomas Cannon who did this in a truly remarkable way. He was a postal worker in Richmond, Virginia, who lived much of his life on the edge of poverty so that he could give to those in need. Describing himself as "a poor man's philanthropist," he gave away more than \$150,000 to people who were experiencing hard times, or who had been unusually kind or brave. He gave these gifts over

the last 33 years of his life, mostly in the form of \$1,000 checks.

He traced his inspiration to his time in the Navy. While he was away at signal school, there was a shipboard explosion at the Port of Chicago and many of his shipmates were killed. He concluded that he was spared for a reason — to help others, to be a role model, to inspire people to see what he called "the oneness of it all."

Cannon gave to people of all ages, races, nationalities, and incomes. He gave to a low-income woman who started a youth center in her apartment complex . . . to a retired postal worker who was a regular volunteer at an elementary school . . . to a woman and a man who wanted to return to Vietnam to visit their hometown . . . to an advocate for the victims of crime . . . and to a teenager who had been abandoned as an infant but grew up to be named Virginia's Youth of the Year.

This generosity didn't come without sacrifice. Cannon supported his wife, his two sons, and himself and his charitable efforts on a salary that never exceeded \$20,000 a year. When he retired from the postal service in 1983, he and his wife lived near the poverty line on his pension. "We lived simply," he said before his death in 2005, "so we could give money away."

He wasn't unhappy about these sacrifices. In fact, he had a great sense of humor, one that he kept even after being diagnosed with terminal cancer. As his health was failing, he told the Richmond newspaper, "A Baptist deacon who owed me \$200 died recently. First thing I'm going to do when I get to the other side is run him down."

Thomas Cannon didn't want a foundation to be set up to continue his work after his death. He feared that a foundation would require a bureaucracy, and tons of paperwork. He didn't even what his name attached to anything. He just left one simple request: "Help somebody."

I have an elderly lady that I see and pray with regularly. She needs so much reassurance and reminders on just how much Jesus loves us. I have given this reading to her. She tells me she reads this daily and gets comfort from it. I thought I would share it with all of you—Always good to be reminded of how much He loves us.



Jesus said "I Love You" with

his life by showing up for all of us and giving us hope for our messy lives. He left His throne to come to earth and save us from ourselves. It's through His life and presence in our hearts that we can learn to love ourselves and others.

Sadness runs deep in our world today especially for those who don't know what real love is. Through the life of Jesus, we learn to see that love is more than just words. Love is taking action.

"Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, and it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres" (1 Corinthians 13:4-8)

This kind of love doesn't just happen. It's the kind of love that we must act upon. Love is not just a feeling, it is a choice. Jesus wasn't forced to love us. He chose to love us with open arms nailed to the cross. Jesus is love.

Jesus is our Savior who came to earth to show us how much He loved us. He walked and talked with sinners like us. He shared His time with people, teaching and coaching them on how they should live.

He wasn't just a good man; He is the light of the world and He has made a way for all of us to live eternally with Him in Heaven. He died on the cross for our sins and was raised from the grave.

A good shepherd spends time with his sheep. He cares for them through the long, dark nights and keeps them sheltered from storm. Jesus is right there with us in the darkest places. Patiently he waits for us to look up and reach out our hands to Him. This is true love.

Jesus spent time with sinners and those who were sick. He ate and drank with those that no one else would dare come close too. When the world rejects us, we know that we have a Good Shepherd who loves us! His love brings healing to the broken-hearted and sick. Jesus showed His love through His life by visiting the poor, widows, and orphans. Jesus lived His life for a purpose, and that was to serve all. He brought hope to all who would receive Him and He calls us to do the same!

Jesus spent time with His disciples teaching and encouraging them. They ate meals together while they fellowshipped and they went together to minister to crowds of people. Jesus promised His disciples that they would not be alone when He left. He knew that they would miss Him and He promised them the comfort of the Holy Spirit. We receive the Holy Spirit when we ask Jesus into our hearts.

The Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are one! When we pray to our Father in Jesus' name, we can be sure that we are in His presence. We enter the throne room of prayer because of the blood of Jesus. Jesus will show us a better way to live and He will give us tools, strategies, discernment and wisdom to do so. He speaks to our heart in many different ways. We all have sinned. Shame and guilt keep us downward spiral. When Jesus rose from the dead, He took our sins and gave us new life. We are free to live at peace with ourselves, change the way we do things, and not go back to our old ways.

Jesus makes all things new for those who love Him. The greatest love story ever told is the one of Jesus dying on the cross for our sins. He has made a way for us to enter the throne room and live eternal life with Him in Paradise.

Jesus came to show us that He desires relationship. He longs for us to receive His unconditional love. He took our guilt and shame on the cross and daily provides us grace, mercy, and do-overs! 
