Elisha and the floating Axe head

In the 2 King 6, there is a story of Elisha with his students. The group of Elisha in that old time looks like a theological seminary of those who followed Elisha. It indicates that at this time Elisha had a

significant impact on the nation. They lived together to learn from the prophet teacher Elisha. The space was not large enough to live together, so they decided to move, and to build a bigger building so that all his students might live together. When they came to the Jordan, they cut down trees. But as one was cutting down a tree, the iron axe head flew, and fell into the water. And he cried out and said, "Alas master! For it was borrowed." So Elisha cut off a stick, and threw it into the water; and he made the iron float. A miracle happened.

Whenever people gather and work together for a good purpose, there are always things that happen. Elisha's theological seminary was flourishing; they had to expand their space. What a joyful thing to work with! They had to build a bigger building. The students had no money to purchase an axe. The item made of iron



must have been very expensive at that time so they borrowed it. When they started to cut wood, the head of the axe flew from the handle of it, and fell into a pond. There was no way to get the axe back. What would you do? What we could you do in that situation? It would be to kneel and pray until the axe floats. It is to kneel and pray until the miracle of God happens. God uses Elisha to throw a stick.

Does our church have any axes that have been borrowed and lost? Yes. We also want to build a church. We need

something very important to build the church of God, and do not have the tool. What should we do? We should cry out, "Alas, what shall we do!" Elisha was a man of God who had a powe of God. Elisha took a stick, threw it in the water and the axe floated. They retrieved it.

What should we do? What axe did we lose in the last years? Financial axe, youth ministry axe, and future vision axe since without younger family there is no future for our church. Imagine what our church would look like in 20 years? It is a truth of our church. We should kneel, and pray fervently until it appears in front us and we take it back to build the house of God continuously. Of course, we all need to do what we can do during the waiting period. Let's respond to it with small things we can do and with prayer from our deep heart. We will see God will perform a miracle of a floating axe head. Thank you Lord, you are always with us!


September 10 – First day of Sunday school. May God bless our faithful teachers and helpers.

Practice Makes Perfect...

In the last six minutes of the University of Kentucky's 1996 national semifinal men's basketball victory over the top-ranked University Massachusetts, Mark Pope – Rhodes Scholar candidate and senior - calmly sank all six of his free throws. Twice he stepped to the line with Kentucky clinging to a three-point lead. Pope did not miss. Putting to rest the speculation that Kentucky would wilt in the national spotlight, Pope remarked after the game, "We go through those exact situations every day in practice. That gives us all confidence in ourselves because we have confidence in our preparation." Just as Pope recognized that practice is the key to playing a good basketball game, we understand that the same is true in every aspect of our lives. Children are reminded to do their homework so they can do well on their tests. Youth learning to drive can practice for up to 12 months with a permit before they get their own driver's licenses and set out on their own. Speeches and presentations are reviewed and practiced, giving the deliverer the familiarity needed to speak confidently and clearly. Christian discipleship is no different. Routine and practice are needed to give us the foundation we need to face the dilemmas we encounter in life. The habitats of worship, generosity, daily prayer, study, and the sacraments help us develop our relationship with God so that we don't find ourselves scrambling when hard times hit. While it is true that God will never abandon us in difficult times whether we have this foundation or not, it is easier to rely on our faith while the seas of life are calm instead of trying to anchor ourselves amid a storm.



From The Garden



Trying to find new recipes for all that squash and zucchini? Here are a few new ones to try: Squash and zucchini are interchangeable in all three of these. Removing the seeds will make your dish less watery.

Chicken Bake:

Grease 9 X 9 casserole dish.

Dice or shred 4 cups of zucchini/squash.

Add ¼ cup of water

Optional: Diced leftover chicken, Onions, Peppers Pour 1 can cream of chicken soup (undiluted) over the mixture. Cover/seal dish with foil and bake at 375 for one hour.

Italian Bake:

Grease 9 X 9 casserole dish.

Dice or shred 4 cups of zucchini/squash.

Optional: Precooked ground beef or Italian Sausage, Onions, Peppers

Pour 1 can/jar of spaghetti sauce over the mixture. Cover/seal dish with foil and bake at 375 for one hour. Optional: remove from oven add shredded mozzarella bake additional 10 minutes.

Bacon Cheeseburger Bake:

Grease 9 X 9 casserole dish.

Dice or shred 4 cups of zucchini/squash.

Add ¼ cup of water

Pre-cooked ground beef (1 LB)

Optional: onions, peppers, bacon bits

Pour 1 can cheddar cheese soup (undiluted) over the mixture. Cover/seal dish with foil and bake at 375 for one hour.

Recipes can be doubled for 11 X 14 casserole dish. Squash and zucchini are easy to freeze for later use. Just remove seeds, shred or cube and store in bags in the freezer.

Also looking for teachers or helpers. We can be flexible with time. We will be looking for grade 4 and up, who would like to be acolytes and help usher before the church service.


We will also be continuing to host Family Fun Nights twice a month. Have an idea or would like to host. Please let me know. Dates will be posted soon.

Soul Food *By Bishop Hee-Soo Jung*

"Peace, I leave with you. My peace I give to you" John 14: 27

And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" Philippians 4:7.

Peace. This principle is much desired. We seem to encounter so much violence each day. We are living in a culture of violence that is creating great harm. We typically think of dramatic events like mass shootings, genocide, and war.

Yet, consider the acts of violence that are more subtle and yet just as painful, such as exclusion and dominance. There are numerous ways in which we do this, like not honoring another's: language, culture, economic status, gender, sexual orientation, mental capabilities, or social abilities. It is challenging for us to think, act, and live differently.

We are called to a life of holy living. As United Methodists, we have been given guidance from John Wesley in how to live faithfully, in three very specific general rules, which are: do no harm; do good; and attend upon the ordinances of God.

I want to focus on the first general rule of "Do no harm." In John Wesley's societies it meant "no buying or selling of slaves," "no conversations that are meant to tear others down," and, asking one tough and personal question: "have you been buying luxuries for yourself instead of helping the poor?"

We are called to holy living. In so doing, must ask how we live this out. As a people living into "do no harm" and our conference understanding of "beloved community," we: speak kindly and lovingly about and to each other; welcome all people to be part of the church; seek ways that honor language and cultural differences; foster relationships; and be reconciling – a people of grace and forgiveness.

More fully, "do no harm" requires us to move from an individual "me" focus to a more global "we," all while remembering our "why." We "do no harm" because Christ has loved us first and we extend that love to all.

As we approach our time together at Annual Conference, we are challenged to "do no harm," especially as we approve resolutions of disaffiliation. We lament that we have come to a point and time when we can no longer be together. We might hold some resentments for things of the past, for the current journey of The United Methodist Church, or for the beginning of other forms of Methodism. We could be frustrated about the "how" and "why" of disaffiliation.

It is in this time and in these moments that I call upon us to "do no harm," to look for ways to reconcile our hearts and minds to the way of Jesus, and to be the people of grace that God has called us to be.

"Peace, I leave with you. My peace I give to you" (John 14: 27).

Amen.


